Using VISUALS IN AUDITS – an online course by auditors, for auditors

Do you want to learn how to use visuals to analyse your audit data, get on the same page as your team and how to communicate your audit story? Then the brand-new elearning course on the AFROSAI-E Learning Platform (ALP) is the answer.

The Netherlands Court of Audit developed the online course, *Visuals in Audits*, by building on the insights of their <u>Design Audit Team</u>. The interactive course is available free of charge to staff from all SAIs world-wide, for self-paced learning. The course will be of value to SAI auditors who want to increase or test their knowledge in this field. Do you want to know more about this topic? This course is currently available in English and will be made available in Arabic, Dutch, French and Portuguese by August 2021.

The course includes five modules and will take a learner about 90 minutes to complete in full.

- (1) Basics of visual theory The basics of visual theory
- (2) Visuals to analyse How to use visuals to structure and analyse audit data
- (3) Visuals to get on the same page How visuals can help you, your team and your supervisors collaborate to get on the same page
- (4) Visuals to get the message across
 How visual stories can deliver your audit message to your audience
 (5) How to brief a design on 2
- (5) How to brief a designer? How to brief a designer to make visual stories that fit your audit

AFROSAI-E revised Statutes and Regulations



In 2020, our Governing Board members approved the establishment of a Statutes Review Committee to review the AFROSAI-E Statutes and Regulations, which were approved in 2013. The Committee held several meetings over the course of the last year to align the content of these documents with current practices and a progressive view for the future. To enable easier amendment of the Regulations in future, should it be required, the Statutes and Regulations were separated into two documents. Both documents are now available on our website. PFM-RF Tool – Smart Partnership Programme with DeVAL aiding SAIs to contribution to SDG Evaluation





Since its official launch in 2018, the Public Financial Management Reporting Framework (PFM-RF) has been implemented by several SAIs in Africa as well as a number of Portuguese-speaking SAIs outside the Continent. These SAIs are currently at various levels of implementation, having produced both internal and external audit reports using this tool. The latest changes to the tool have enhanced its agility in the audit of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and is therefore poised to aid SAIs to make a greater contribution to their attainment.

The PFM-RF is designed to interrogate the entire Public Financial Management cycle of a country. It focuses on the core PFM institutions and selected line ministries, that play a significant role to the attainment of SDGs.

Together with the GiZ Good Financial Governance Programme in Africa, our thinking behind the PFM-RF is driven by two philosophies:

- 1. The attainment of Agenda 2030, to a reasonable extent is very much dependent on good governance through transparency and accountability in the management of public funds allocated for SDG related programmes. SAIs therefore have a role to play towards the attainment of these goals.
- Well-functioning PFM systems are central in the contribution to the achievement of the SDGs. The reality is that funding national programmes towards the achievement of these goals will only work if PFM systems function efficiently, effectively and consistently for the benefit of citizens.

As part of our *Smart Partnerships Programme*, we are developing a partnership with the German Institute for Development Evaluation (DeVAL). Through this partnership, established with the help of Mr Norbert Hauser, the former Vice President of SAI Germany and Chairman of the Panel of External Auditors of the United Nations, we aim to improve SAI capacity to evaluate the SDGs through the PFM-RF.

DeVAL has published a guide for evaluation commissioners and managers titled *"Evaluation to connect national priorities with the SDGs"*. In May, we participated in a three-day workshop on this guide. The workshop was attended by 30 government officials from Anglophone Africa and Latin America. This highly valuable workshop covered three key areas:

- a) How evaluation can help in connecting the SDGs with national priorities.
- b) How evaluation can capture the multidimensional characteristics of the SDGs.
- c) The role of evaluation in facilitating national policy dialogues and SDGs reporting.

During the workshop, participants recognised the need for SAIs to take a more active role in contributing to the evaluation of the attainment of SDGs by their countries. The workshop outcomes also clearly indicating the benefits of AFROSAI-E becoming an active participant in the EVALSDG network. In line with this outcome, we took part in a panel discussion on 31 May, hosted by DeVAL as part of the gLOCAL 2021 Evaluation week. The topic of discussion was the contribution of SAIs to an evaluation culture – exchange of experiences between Africa and Latin America. Several presenters from the SAI community participated and through the examples shared, the discussions highlighted how SAIs can potentially contribute to a national evaluation system in the context of Agenda 2030 and SDG implementation.

The extent to which a SAI can make a difference to the lives of its citizens depends on the tangible actions it takes. Contributing to the attainment of the SDGs by implementing the Public Financial Management Reporting Framework Version 2.0, is a tangible action that will enable SAIs to make a difference. Evaluation of IDI and AFROSAI-E's dedicated support to SAI Somalia 2018-2020

In partnership with the INTOSAI Development Initiative (IDI) we have been providing the SAI of Somalia with accelerated support since 2018. The support programme will continue in 2021 to 2022 with the objective of enabling SAI Somalia to successfully implement their strategic priorities for the period.

Recently an external evaluation of the 2018 to 2020 project period was concluded. According to the evaluation, the project has made a good contribution to the strengthening of the external audit function in Somalia. The project's objectives were mostly met and the project scores well on the OECD-DAC evaluation criteria. According to the evaluator, the project's contribution has been recognised particularly regarding the introduction of and training on ISSAI-based financial and compliance audit manuals, the introduction of a strategic and annual planning and control cycle and various human resource management tools.

The improvement in the performance of SAI Somalia was evidenced by its ability to audit the Government's annual budget execution report in a timely manner for the first time in 2019 and its willingness to report openly on challenging topics involving corruption and malpractice regarding donor-funds. The Project has also contributed to the drafting a new Audit Law. If enacted, following approval by the President of Somalia, the SAI will achieve a higher degree of independence from the Executive. Once the Act is in place the OAGS will be in a stronger position to make recommendations for the improvement of public financial management by the Somali Government in the coming years.
